

Ordinance re Certain Ministrations in Churches 1922.

AN ORDINANCE to preserve and extend the desire and spirit of Reunion.

WHEREAS in view of the prospects and projects of Reunion it is expedient that occasional authorisation should in certain cases be given to Ministers not episcopally ordained to preach in Churches within the Diocese of Sydney and to clergy of the said Diocese to preach in the Churches of such Ministers, the Synod of the Diocese of Sydney in pursuance of the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the Constitutions for the management and good government of the Church of England within the State of New South Wales ordains and rules as follows:—

1. It shall be lawful for the Archbishop-in-Council from time to time to make regulations to provide for the cases in which the occasions upon which and the Ministers not episcopally ordained to whom authorisation may be given to preach in Churches within the Diocese of Sydney and to provide a form of authorisation.

2. It shall be lawful for the Archbishop to grant authority in accordance with the said regulations and form to any Minister although he shall not have been episcopally ordained and each such Minister shall accordingly be eligible to be permitted to preach in any Church within the Diocese and any clergyman of the Diocese may lawfully avail himself of any permission to preach in the church of such Minister.

3. In the absence of the Archbishop from the State or in the event of a vacancy in the See the provisions of this Ordinance may be applied by the Commissary or the Administrator of the Diocese as the case may be.

4. This Ordinance may be cited as the Ordinance re certain ministrations in Churches 1922.
